Then, as now, our program impact extends far beyond the writing; our programs help students build confidence, gain literacy, and develop key social and emotional skills that help them in the classroom and in life.

Our New York City programs are on the front lines of public education. We serve students experiencing academic delays following the pandemic, neuro-diverse students and students with mental health challenges, recent immigrant and refugees, and students impacted by tragedy overseas. Our programs offer students a creative outlet that honors their experiences and ideas in a safe and supportive space.

Beyond New York City, we continue to increase access to the arts through the Poetry Out Loud program in New York State and through *Teachers & Writers Magazine* globally. These programs form an active network of students, teachers, and teaching artists who believe in the transformative power of the literary arts.

As we look to the year ahead, I thank our many supporters for standing with us in this important work. Our shared vision to increase access to the literary arts will continue to move us forward.

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
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2023 Program Innovation

Youth Programs

Students in grades 3-12 explored their imaginations in 20 workshops at NYC public schools led by T&W teaching artists. Workshop themes ranged from eco-poetry to personal narratives for college applications.

Elementary school programs included an ongoing collaboration with five Title I schools in Brooklyn, Queens, and the Bronx for the sixth consecutive year, offering students a deeply immersive workshop experience writing poetry, fiction, and other forms of imaginative writing. Two programs for young students focused on the environment: at P.S. 19/East Village Community School students wrote poems inspired by the city's water systems; at P.S. 90 students wrote and performed a documentary on environmental justice.

For middle school students, T&W offered a series of play-making programs during which students wrote and performed original plays. High school programs included poetry and college essay writing: students received one-on-one support as they developed winning personal narratives for their college applications.



New Initiatives

In partnership with New York State Poet Laureate Willie Perdomo, T&W launched the East Harlem Poets Collective, a project made possible by the Academy of American Poets Poet Laureate Fellowship award. The project reaches youth in the community of East Harlem through a series of poetry workshops and performances offered in English and Spanish.

T&W also partnered with the New York City Poetry Festival to host their Youth Festival on Governer's Island, New York City. Over the course of the festival we offered writing activities for children and poetry enthusiasts of all ages, including creating a collaborative 100-foot poem, a project published in *The Adventures of Dr. Alphabet* by Dave Morice (Teachers & Writers Collaborative, 2007).

Creative Aging

Our Creative Aging programs give older adults an opportunity to learn new skills and build communities through art making. Programs are offered on-site with our community partners and include drawing and watercolor painting, memoir writing, story telling, and multi-genre writing classes. Our partners are Griot Circle, Selfhelp Services, Visions Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired, JASA, and Morningside Heights Retirement Services.

In 2023, T&W also partnered with the Early Alzheimer's Foundation to support its Memory Tree program, offering creative writing workshops in Spanish and English for people with early stage memory loss and their caregivers.

Cultivating Community for Teachers and Teaching Artists

Teachers became students in two "Summer of Soul" workshops, online poetry and memoir writing programs for NYC public school teachers. In this professional development program, educators engaged in writing activities led by T&W teaching artists while learning to nurture student writing using similar techniques and practices.

T&W teaching artists also saw new opportunities for growth in a series of Artist Meetings: workshops led by and for teaching artists in order to foster a peer-to-peer learning exchange.

T&W continues to build community and mentor young writers and teaching artists through its Editorial and Education Fellowship program. MFA candidates gain hands-on experience and mentorship while assisting in T&W teaching artists in schools. They also host literary events and serve as editors of *Teachers & Writers Magazine*, an important resource for writers and educators all over the world.

An Upgrade for *Teachers & Writers Magazine*

In 2022, the staff embarked on a project to update the look & functionality of *Teachers & Writers Magazine* website, with support of a grant from LitNYS. The new site, launched in January 2023, increases access to the magazine's lesson plans and essays, and makes the archive of articles available in print readily available.

The magazine's editorial board selected William Camponovo's essay, "You Must Change Your Life: Demystifying and Remystifying Poetry in the Classroom," as the winner of the 2023 Bechtel Prize. The Bechtel Prize is named for Louise Seaman Bechtel, who was an editor, author, collector of children's books, and teacher. This award honors her legacy.


Poetry Out Loud

In March 2023, 20 high school students from around the state gathered at the Center for Fiction in Brooklyn to perform for the title of New York State Poetry Out Loud champion. This event was the culmination of months of activity, engaging high school students through poetry in 56 schools throughout the state. POL is a national poetry recitation competition, open to students in grades 9-12, in partnership with the New York State Council on the Arts.



Our Reach


In 2023, T&W increased access to high-quality arts education throughout New York, focusing on communities of the highest need.



75% of youth programs in NYC are in Title I public schools where children from low-income families make up at least 40% of enrollment






Teaching Artist Khadija Bangoura with students in Manhattan
